Venerable Henriette's practice of heroic virtue

"Mother Henriette was a very holy and heavenly soul . . . who took her fortunes to found our dear community . . . But Delille's capacity was much more valuable than the money, for she was a good beggar . . . It would be well to say we sometimes knew not from where the next piece of bread was to come." Thus says Sister Bernard Deggs in her Journal, No Cross, No Crown, p. 95.

Sister Bernard wrote this sentence over 100 plus years ago. It was true then and it is true today. We honor Mother Henriette as a woman who practiced heroic virtue. This is what prompted Pope Benedict XVI to declare her venerable.

"I believe in God. I hope in God. I love. I want to live and die for God." is indicative of a woman who loved God with all her heart. As a result of this love, she practiced faith, hope, charity, the cardinal virtues, the evangelical counsels, humility, simplicity, to mention a few.

In this edition, Henriette's practice of faith will be explained. In subsequent issues, her other virtues will be considered. Now for faith: not only did Henriette believe in God, but she spent her life teaching others how to believe in God.


She and her companions' major work

was to evangelize and cathecize "their people, slave and free." In doing this, they took risks. This took faith. Even though times were hard, Henriette, Juliette, and Josephine believed that God would provide and He did.

In addition, Henriette assisted in the What are some of Venerable role of Godmother in baptisms. She Henriette's virtues? Truly her prayer, was involved in setting up and running schools for the benefit of the Black people in her city in which religious instruction played a central role. Finally, she founded a new community of religious, composed of Black Sisters, to serve the needs of her people.

My Pilgrimage to Haiti

We arrived in Haiti mid-morning on July 15th 2010. The plan was to arrive before Hurricane season in Haiti and to return to New Orleans before the peak Hurricane season here. We accomplished both.

Nothing could have prepared us for what arriving in Haiti is like. Sights and sounds, smells, human movements reminded me of a typical West African city. Though centuries and distance away, the *joie de vive* of peoples of African descent still prevails in Haiti.

Port-au-Prince is a city of about nine million people. Most are small merchants and traders. Goods come in and out from the country side and are traded in small markets along narrow streets. Children are everywhere. Sad to say the prevailing common denominator is poverty.

The earthquake which destroyed Haiti on January 12, 2010, did not have to work very hard to achieve its goals. The best image I saw to describe Haiti is the room of a religious brother in the middle of

nowhere surrounded by destruction everywhere, adorned with a small bed, a chair, a cat and small modern radio. That's Haiti.

Music, animals (especially dogs) abide. People go about their lives as though normal. They have tried for centuries to better their lot, but without success.

"Le tremblement de terre," the earthquake brought massive destruction on a country already deprived of basic human needs. I do not attempt to try to say what the solution for Haiti 's problem " should be". All I know is that this global community we call world, has a responsibility to heed the gospel mandate to be our neighbors keeper.

The Gospel is not a simple series of worded beatitudes, it is the way God would have us live as Christians, Muslims, Jews, whatever our faith tradition might be.

Our mission to Haiti was to do what little we could to bring hope to

a few people. I think we accomplished this.

We met and visited with religious men and women who are indigenous to Haiti. We offered them small donations in the name of the generous people of the Church of New Orleans. They are teaching children of all ages under the most inhumane circumstances. They are leading people in prayer, retreats, and long vigils. They are caring for the sick and wounded in the most primitive circumstances.

They are feeding the hungry, and sheltering the homeless. These Religious are doing this out of conditions of their own, which are no better than their neighbors.

The rains have come. God's children of Haiti are once again doing battle with nature. The temporary shelters are a mere drop in the bucket for the over million and half people who are homeless, with no promise of FEMA or Road Home Money. The medical equipment and supplies are locked up expiring, because providers must pay a duty to the government. Doctors are no longer caring for those who are sick with simple illnesses that are treatable with antibiotics.

We saw aid workers, especially Jesuits Relief workers, offering counseling to people who are traumatized; especially, we saw children looking for their parents. Children who are Restavek (literally slaves). This is a large population of Haitian children who are used for child labor.

We met a parish priest who lost the entire parish plant. The priests continue to minister and offer space for prayer to the people who continue to come to the sacred grounds. We proposed parish twinning with some of our parishes in the archdiocese.

We heard talk of the upcoming elections in November, of the number of and candidates running for president. Each has an agenda to make Haiti better. Some speak of decentralization, moving some services to the country-

side, like hospitals and universities. This will provide jobs and remove the strain on Port-au-Prince, some say. Or make Port-au-Prince, green space. We heard this plan before.

But for the people, life goes on: "long days turn into night and the sun also rises" So is daily life for our Neighbors next door.


